Gymnastics team. "It definitely inspired me," Kathleen said Friday.

A gymnast since age 4, she is one of several Long Islanders who were encouraged by the winning performances of the U.S. gymnastics team in Athens.

"They showed [young gym-nasts] that they should never give up," said Linda Clifford, Kathleen's mother, about Patterson and Paul Hamm of Wisconsin, who clinched Olympic gold in the men's all-around Wednesday night. "They both had problems in the beginning and wound up coming back strong and

"This really brings gymnastics to the forefront again," Rhatigan-Drexler said.

erybody is so excited."
Truhlar, who came to Long Island from the Czech Republic 34 years ago, said she remembers the great enthusiasm generated by Mary Lou Retton's gold medal two decades

"We are expecting a big turnout in the fall," said Caryl Crasa, owner of Exper-Tiess

Gymnastics in Saint James, which trains 60 boys and girls for competitions.

"It's been pretty exciting overall."

Tammy Marshall, a gymnas-tics coach and the of Gold Medal Gymnastics, which has a team of 45 girls who compete at local and national events and more than 500 non-competitive students, said Patterson sets a great example for the girls - aged 5 to 18 - and teaches them about hard work.

The gold medal, "is going to become the dream of all lit-tle girls here," she said.
